Thoughtcrime is any oppositional thought (or resulting action) against the Party. An example of Winston committing thoughtcrime is writing "down with Big Brother" in his journal.

Doublethink is reality control. It is the power to hold two completely contradictory beliefs in one's mind at the same time. An example: $2 + 2 = 4$ AND $2 + 2 = 5$.
