

REVIEW - ORWELL

- The name **George Orwell** is a <u>pseudonym</u> he was born Eric Arthur Blair in 1903
- First work published in 1933 (Down and Out in Paris and London)
- Best known for Animal Farm (1945) and 1984 (1949)



• Died in January of 1950 of tuberculosis

1984

· Dark, satirical political science-fiction novel:

- Dark in the sense of depicting a very bleak, dystopian society
- Satirical because it uses irony, exaggeration, and to some degree, ridicule to criticize within a political context
- Science-fiction because it depicts an imagined future and major social changes

1984

 Many aspects of Oceania's society are based on or are exaggerated versions of true political philosophies or historical events that occurred around the time that Orwell wrote the novel (SEE LESSON #I, SLIDE #6 FOR MORE INFORMATION)

What was George Orwell's purpose in writing 1984?

PURPOSE OF 1984

- 1984 was meant to act as a powerful warning against the dangers of a totalitarian society
- Orwell had witnessed the dangers of absolute political authority himself, especially as technological advances continued to progress
- He imagined a horrible, bleak **dystopia**, with the intention of portraying what can be considered one of the worst human societies imaginable in an effort to convince readers to avoid any path that might lead toward such social degradation

THEME = UNIVERSALITY + AN ASPECT OF THE HUMAN CONDITION

The Dangers of Totalitarianism:

• Orwell portrays the perfect totalitarian society in **1984**. By making the title a real year that would come to pass, Orwell's story was meant to represent a real possibility for the near future - if totalitarianism were not opposed, the society depicted in his novel could realistically come to exist in only 35 years

- The importance of independence and individual identity:
 - The Party's use of physical and psychological manipulation makes clear just how important both independence and individual identity are
 - Being free, independent, and having a clear idea of who one is as an individual brings meaning to life and allows human beings to thrive

- The Dangers of Psychological Manipulation and Physical Control:
 - We see this explored in the novel through the use of psychological stimuli and physical torture designed to overwhelm the mind's capacity for independent thought
 - Use of propaganda and technology
 - Destruction of the family
 - Suppression of emotion and sexual desire

The Desolation of Loneliness and Isolation:

- Characters in the novel suffer from not being able or allowed to create meaningful connections (based on feeling and emotion) with others
- Even when the attempt at a deeper connection is made (Winston & Julia), the emotions and desires involved are warped or misunderstood
